Divorce Remarriage

You remember we just did the three part series on the sacrament of matrimony. And I readily acknowledge that three small homilies on such an incredibly important sacrament can only barely touch the surface.

Marriage is like the proverbial iceberg. I can talk about the three vows of faithfulness and permanence and fruitfulness—but eighty percent of whatever we could say about of marriage is still to be revealed.

For this reason I would encourage everyone—married or not—to pray for husbands and wives—fathers and mothers--children and parents. Because marriage and family are under assault—and all of us—including priests—have a stake in the health of families.

Truly, if the purpose of this life is to serve God in all things so that we can get to heaven—then healthy marriages and strong families in this life—will help all of us achieve happiness in the next life. It is all of a piece.

And as I mentioned—the Catholic Church—who is the Teacher of the world—makes a big deal out of the issue of divorce and remarriage—because she makes a big deal out of marriage.

When marriage is treated by a culture as something less important than it really is—or when we develop false notions about what marriage is—that is when we have problems.

Now by culture I mean—the way people think about things, appreciate things—and value things. Culture is the soul of man writ large.

Whatever is going on in here—in our hearts and minds—is being displayed out there—in our music and literature—but conversely—whatever is going on out there—in the world—in politics—entertainment—the media—the negative values, or faithlessness or lack of virtue or enthronement of selfishness (all that which is being presented to us on a constant and daily basis—even as we stand there at Jewel looking at the tabloids) all of that has an effect on us in here, in our hearts and souls. It can hurt us and change us—and we don't even know it.

Basically I am talking about pop culture which is by definition, popular. I am talking about the songs we sing, the books and magazines we read and the films and shows we watch—and those things can reinforce virtue or vice. All that information coming into our eyes and ears and minds will have an effect on how we perceive life or love--marriage or family.

Look at how superficially marriage and family can be treated by a culture—just watch any movie from the early 1930's or after about 1965. It is appalling and amazing to watch movies where men and women walk in and out of marriage as if they were walking in and out of a store. Marriage and faithfulness in some of these movies is almost a running joke.

Adultery is the theme and divorce is the plot device. Thank God they never have children in these movies. I suppose it would only complicate the story by showing a gaggle of heartbroken crushed kids in tears as their parents flit from partner to partner.

But it is not outlandish to think that our modern pop culture has successfully normalized the abnormal and helped transform the immoral and perverse into just another facet of modern life. The suffering this has caused is immeasurable. The amazing thing is that we hardly notice it. And why not? Because it has been done so subtly.

Well this ad had a large photo of two hockey players fighting. One (with a cigarette in his mouth) is slugging the other one; and the player on the bottom is holding up his glove to defend himself.

But what label do I spy on the glove of the player on the bottom? Not Rawlings nor Wilson nor Everlast. No—his label says "Cancer"

Just as plain as you can imagine. I showed it to my brother, "Look at this—what do think this means?" His interpretation (and I am sure he was right) was that the cigarette companies wanted us to learn—subliminally—underneath the threshold of our consciousness—not to worry about cigarettes. They wanted to get across the message that just like the player on the bottom of the pile-up—cancer is being beaten.

You see, we all go through life as learners. What we see and what we hear and what we experience—even if we don't notice it--comes into our eyes and ears and brains and stays there.

It may lie hidden or buried in the subconscious. But it is there. It may be something good—or it may be bad—maybe it is a tiny virus—that one day will be triggered back to life and multiply its corruption and destroy our lives or our souls.

Of course that information is there. Where else can it go? It is like the information on your laptop. It is sitting there underneath the battery waiting to be called out and used again. It is there.

Thankfully God has made us in such a way that all that is in our minds and hearts and souls most of the time lies fallow and quiet and forgotten. Thank God for that, because it would not be good for us to be overwhelmed by all that history and all those experiences, and all those memories crashing in on our consciousness all at the same time.

Nevertheless—everything that comes into our minds by means of our senses influences us. All that information and all those experiences—the things we see and the things we hear and the things we feel—all of it shades us and forms us and molds us—ever so gently—ever so slowly—ever so surely.

That is why in order to save our lives (to say nothing of saving our souls) we must be very careful of what we take in—of what we ingest—of what we see and of what we hear. Because we are unaware most of the time of how we are being effected by it—or changed. We need to make ourselves aware of what is coming in to us.

If we can understand that we are being manipulated (and almost all the time) we have a chance.

I read somewhere—about Facebook—that many people wonder how there seems to be this huge social communications service that you don't even have to pay for—Facebook. They ask: where do they get the money to run this thing?

And the point was made—that if you can't figure what the product is that they are selling—then *you* are the product. And they are selling *you*.

And in order to sell us—they have to manipulate us and fatten us and make us sellable.

This is why we must be wary of all entertainments—movies—television—books—magazines—radio—music—anything that make light of traditional moral values. We must avoid anything that disparages marriage and family or laughs at the concept of one husband and one wife and one family or mocks faithfulness or despises having children or staying together.

Does that mean that we should no longer participate in modern popular culture? Maybe. Does it mean we

We might need to start isolating ourselves from all the bad learning possible out there.

But it works the other way too.

If we consume good things—if we read and watch and listen and sing only that which is beautiful and happy and whole and even holy, the bad will be subsumed and buried—hopefully never to surface again; and the good (which Our Lord has always intended for us) particularly as it revolves around love and life—marriage and family—will become who we are—

And we will be beautiful because we will be good—And we will be good because we come from God Himself who is true.

And all those bad evil things that have conspired to hurt matrimony and marriage--- to injure our husbands and wives—mothers and fathers--sons and daughters—all of that ugliness and dirt will be buried under the
