

Ramblings - Fr. Frankin

From a talk Fr. Frankin gave to our catechism classes.

I think it would be good if we did some catechism on the Mass today—not just for all the young people that are here—and who will be here the rest of the year—but for the sake of all of us—myself included.

I do hope that all of us—even if we are surprised at having Latin sometimes during the English or Spanish Mass—will come to appreciate its power and its purpose.

First of all—we should not puzzle but celebrate the fact that some of the prayers are occasionally in Latin. I know that this is not our language. But Latin is a beautiful language—it even sounds beautiful—and in fact is the original Spanish—the original Italian and French and even Rumanian. Half of English has Latin roots.

So even though we don't understand Latin as a regular language—it is a good thing to use it—because it has a way of connecting us to God—and it connects us to our ancestors—our parents and grandparents and great grandparents—who heard Latin every time they went to Mass.

If the truth be told I would be bold enough to say that going to Mass in Latin actually helped them to be wonderful people and wonderful Catholics they are and were—and I have no problem saying that they were holier people than we are. If we could be like our grandparents and great grandparents who went to Mass in Latin every day—we would be doing ok.

So don't worry about the Latin. The missalettes have all the English we need to understand the prayers.

They are beautiful prayers and they tell us all we need to know about what is happening in our Mass and in our lives—in our past and in our future.

So what happens in the Mass?

Well a couple weeks ago we talked about how the priest—is walking up the Hill of Golgotha—to ascend to the place of Sacrifice—Calvary!—Calveria—the skull place. And those stairs are the mountain he walks up.

You will remember how we begin the Mass with the Penitential Rite—and we pray the Confiteor asking God and all the saints to forgive us our sins. We know that we are not worthy to be in front of God. We are sinful and sorrowful for sure. Noisy.

We must say we are sorry for any sins and bad things we have done. Then we say Kyrie Eleison—Christe Eleison—Senor ten piedad—Cristo ten piedad—Lord have Mercy! Christ have mercy!

We are at God's mercy for everything and we ask that He give us that mercy—now and all through our lives. If we are sad—please make us happy. If we are sinful—please forgive us. If we are sick—please heal us. If we are dying—please take us to heaven. Don't leave us as we are. Lord have mercy—Christ have mercy. Lord have mercy.

And then we are so happy that God is going to do all this for us—that He is going to have mercy on us, we burst into the song the Angels sang so long ago—at Christmas—the song which they still sing—the Gloria! “Glory to God in the highest and peace to men of good will!”

That means God is great—God is all powerful—and He loves us so much that He will take away our sins—and there in Heaven God reigns gloriously—with Jesus at His right hand and the Holy Spirit hovering over all—and it is glorious! and whoever understands how great and glorious and all loving God is—well—they are full of joy and must of necessity burst into song. Nothing can touch them. The True God—the triune God has their back. And That's a good feeling.

After the Gloria—we do the opening prayer. Here we pray to God for everything. And why? Because He has everything—and we need everything. Now in a more ideal way of praying the Mass, according to Cardinal Sarah of the

Vatican, the priest is looking towards God—and not towards us—because he—and we—are speaking to God. It would be silly for the priest to look at us—when he is talking to God the Father.

Don't worry. If the priest is ever saying the prayers of the Mass facing the Cross, he is not ignoring you—he is involving you—that's why he says "Let us pray" and we do pray.

The Opening prayer is the theme for the day. The Church—in that prayer—sets up what we will be praying for in our hearts during this Mass. Maybe we will be praying for health or happiness for ourselves and others. Maybe we will be praying for the spirit of Thanksgiving for all that God has given to us. Maybe we will be praying for the dead—or for sorrow for our sins which brought Jesus to the cross—but we are praying to God and not to each other!

And then we start the readings.

Now what are the readings? That's the Bible—that's right—the readings are the Word of God.

A lot of people say Catholics don't read the Bible—Wrong! We read the Bible at every Mass—and almost every prayer we say at Mass comes from somewhere in the Bible. And what is the word of God? It is God explaining to us—how He is going to get us to heaven.

That's it in nutshell.

You know and I know—that we are not so good—not so holy as we would like to be—we disobey our parents and grandparents—we use bad words—see and say inappropriate things. And we are not alone—everyone in this world is not so good. Adults and kids. And this goes all the way back to Adam and Eve.

Believe me—we could all be better—and we better be better or we are not going to heaven. And if you don't go to heaven—you end up in Hell—and that is the worst possible fate. And so how is God going to get us to heaven? I will grant it is a struggle—because we are tempted against God—all the time—and we kind of fight Him—every step of the way.

God is going to send His Son who is going to die for us. And that's what all those Bible readings are all about. It tells us how God set it all up—from Adam and Eve in the Garden and how they failed the test and believed the Devil.

The Bible tells us how we had to wait and wait and be prepared and suffer and struggle until Jesus was born on Christmas Day. We learn from the Bible—the readings—that Jesus is Lord and the Son of God and we hear about all the beautiful things He said to the Apostles and Disciples—and actually to us.

The readings of the Epistle and Gospel—tell us who God is and what He did for us. And they also tell us what we need to do in response. The readings tell us how to give thanks to God—how to love and be good. How to be strong in the face of the world that wants us to be bad. And what do I mean by that?

You know and I know that everything you see and hear—the music—the videos—the songs and movies—most of it in one way or another is inappropriate. Most of it you couldn't play in Church or even in front of your parents.

And it's not just music. It's not just movies. They are trying to teach you stuff that your parents would not approve. Now remember—your parents love you—and they only want the best for you. The people who make those songs and videos—they only care about money—and they don't care if you get hurt—they don't care if you get confused or troubled. As long as you buy their stuff—download all their music and pay for it!—they don't care about anything else.

And that's why we go to Mass—and read the Bible at Mass—we have to know that there is another way of life—and it doesn't involve Katy Perry or Justin Bieber. It involves God and is about what God does for us—it's about being strong so you can get to heaven.

The readings we can do in English—on the sheets we have—or if Father reads them another time. But this is the Word of God—and if it's coming from God—we need to listen to Him. And that will tell us all we need to know. We will continue this next week.




